

# Eighty Years of *Sources Chrétiennes* (1942/43–2023)

With volumes lining the shelves of libraries around the world, Sources Chrétiennes is the most important bilingual series of critical editions in the field of Patrology, boasting of more than 600 titles in its collection. Its eighty-year long journey began with the publication of St. Gregory of Nyssa's treatise On the Life of Moses in 1942–43 by Jean Daniélou, who, together with Henri de Lubac and Claude Mondésert-academic theologians and Jesuit priests like himself-conceived of the series and established its editorial framework. Today, we are celebrating the completion of eighty years since the publication of this first volume that launched the series Sources Chrétiennes with an International Conference dedicated to the Fathers of the Church. As the title of the Conference implies, the aim is to highlight the continued relevance of the Fathers' preaching for the modern world. Though we are separated from them by many centuries, and we live in a world that hardly resembles theirs, on account of the tectonic shifts brought about in the modern age by the industrial revolution and the rapid developments of science and technology, their writings have retained their enduring value to the present day. They are, to use the famous phrase of Thucydides,  $\kappa \tau \tilde{\eta} \mu \alpha \dot{\epsilon} \zeta \dot{\alpha} \dot{\epsilon} \dot{\iota}$  — "a possession for all time" given to humanity. Besides the Gospel message that they transmit about redemption from sin and death, they also instruct and educate man. By studying them, we obtain the benefit that is offered, according to the ancient Greek historian, by every work destined for eternity: τῶν τε γενομένων τὸ σαφὲς σκοπεῖν καὶ τῶν μελλόντων ποτὲ αὖθις κατὰ τὸ ἀνθρώπινον—that is to say, they provide us with a proper understanding of the events that have marked our past and that are likely to repeat in a similar fashion in the future, due to the fixed laws governing human nature (History I, 22, 4). Human nature and its laws, as understood by the Fathers of the Church and analyzed in their sermons, treatises, and interpretative writings, provide the thematic framework for the scholarly concerns to be addressed by the Conference, which takes place today in honor of the series Sources Chrétiennes through the cooperation of academic institutions from Greece and France.
